Was sind Adverbien? - What are adverbs?

Adverbs (Adverbien) are words that modify verbs, adjectives, or other adverbs. They provide information about how, when, where, or to what extent an action is performed. German adverbs are essential for expressing nuance and precision in your speech and writing. Unlike adjectives, adverbs are generally invariable - they don't change form based on case, gender, or number.

1 Formation of German Adverbs

Bildung der Adverbien - How German adverbs are created

1.1 Adverbs from Adjectives

Unlike French or English, German adverbs are often **identical** to the uninflected adjective form:

1.1.1 Regular Formation

- **schnell** → **schnell** - *fast* → *fast/quickly*
Er läuft schnell.
He runs fast.
- **gut** → **gut** - *good* → *well*
Sie singt gut.
She sings well.
- **langsam** → **langsam** - *slow* → *slowly*
Das Auto fährt langsam.
The car drives slowly.
- **laut** → **laut** - *loud* → *loudly*
Er spricht laut.
He speaks loudly.

1.1.2 Adverbs ending in -weise

Some adverbs are formed by adding **-weise** to nouns or adjectives:

- **teilweise** - *partially*
Das Projekt ist teilweise fertig.
The project is partially finished.
- **normalerweise** - *normally*
Normalerweise trinke ich Kaffee.
Normally, I drink coffee.
- **glücklicherweise** - *fortunately*
Glücklicherweise ist nichts passiert.
Fortunately, nothing happened.
- **möglicherweise** - *possibly*
Er kommt möglicherweise später.
He'll possibly come later.

1.1.3 Adverbs ending in -lich

- **wirklich** - *really*
Das ist wirklich schwer.
That's really difficult.
- **eigentlich** - *actually*
Eigentlich wollte ich gehen.
Actually, I wanted to go.
- **kürzlich** - *recently*
Ich habe ihn kürzlich gesehen.
I saw him recently.
- **plötzlich** - *suddenly*
Plötzlich begann es zu regnen.
Suddenly it started to rain.

1.2 Adverbs ending in -s

Many German adverbs end in -s:

- **rechts** - *to the right*
Gehen Sie rechts.
Go to the right.
- **links** - *to the left*
Das Haus steht links.
The house is on the left.
- **nachts** - *at night*
Nachts ist es kalt.
At night it's cold.
- **morgens** - *in the morning*
Morgens trinke ich Tee.
I drink tea in the morning.
- **abends** - *in the evening*
Abends sehe ich fern.
I watch TV in the evening.

2 Adverbs of Manner

Adverbien der Art und Weise - How something is done

2.1 Common Manner Adverbs

- **gut** - *well*
Er spielt gut Klavier.
He plays piano well.
- **schlecht** - *badly*
Sie tanzt schlecht.
She dances badly.
- **schnell** - *quickly/fast*
Das Auto fährt schnell.
The car drives fast.
- **langsam** - *slowly*
Sprich langsam, bitte.
Speak slowly, please.
- **leise** - *quietly/softly*
Die Kinder spielen leise.
The children play quietly.
- **laut** - *loudly*
Der Hund bellt laut.
The dog barks loudly.
- **vorsichtig** - *carefully*
Fahr vorsichtig!
Drive carefully!
- **zusammen** - *together*
Wir arbeiten zusammen.
We work together.

2.2 Advanced Manner Adverbs

- **sorgfältig** - *carefully/thoroughly*
Er hat die Arbeit sorgfältig gemacht.
He did the work carefully.
- **gründlich** - *thoroughly*
Sie hat gründlich geputzt.
She cleaned thoroughly.
- **heftig** - *violently/intensely*
Es regnet heftig.
It's raining heavily.
- **allmählich** - *gradually*
Das Wetter wird allmählich besser.
The weather is gradually getting better.

- **absichtlich** - *intentionally*
Er hat das absichtlich gemacht.
He did that intentionally.
- **versehentlich** - *accidentally*
Ich habe das versehentlich getan.
I did that accidentally.

3 Adverbs of Time

Zeitadverbien - When something happens

3.1 Basic Time Adverbs

- **jetzt** - *now*
Ich muss jetzt gehen.
I have to go now.
- **heute** - *today*
Heute ist schönes Wetter.
Today the weather is nice.
- **gestern** - *yesterday*
Gestern war ich im Kino.
Yesterday I was at the movies.
- **morgen** - *tomorrow*
Morgen fahren wir nach Berlin.
Tomorrow we're going to Berlin.
- **bald** - *soon*
Er kommt bald zurück.
He'll be back soon.
- **spät** - *late*
Wir kommen zu spät.
We're arriving late.
- **früh** - *early*
Ich stehe früh auf.
I get up early.
- **oft** - *often*
Wir gehen oft ins Theater.
We often go to the theater.

3.2 Frequency Adverbs

- **immer** - *always*
Er ist immer pünktlich.
He's always punctual.
- **nie/niemals** - *never*
Ich esse nie Fleisch.
I never eat meat.
- **manchmal** - *sometimes*
Manchmal gehe ich schwimmen.
Sometimes I go swimming.
- **selten** - *rarely*
Es regnet selten hier.
It rarely rains here.
- **häufig** - *frequently*
Sie reist häufig geschäftlich.
She frequently travels for business.
- **meistens** - *usually/mostly*
Meistens nehme ich den Bus.
I usually take the bus.
- **regelmäßig** - *regularly*
Er treibt regelmäßig Sport.
He exercises regularly.

3.3 Sequential Time Adverbs

- **zuerst** - *first*
Zuerst müssen wir einkaufen.
First we have to go shopping.
- **dann** - *then*
Dann kochen wir das Essen.
Then we cook the meal.
- **schließlich/endlich** - *finally*
Endlich können wir essen!
Finally we can eat!
- **vorher** - *before/previously*
Ich war vorher noch nie hier.
I had never been here before.
- **nachher** - *afterwards*
Nachher gehen wir spazieren.
Afterwards we'll go for a walk.

- **schon** - *already*
Er ist schon weg.
He's already gone.
- **noch** - *still/yet*
Sie schläft noch.
She's still sleeping.

4 Adverbs of Place

Ortsadverbien - Where something happens

- **hier** - *here*
Komm hier her!
Come here!
- **da/dort** - *there*
Er wohnt dort.
He lives there.
- **überall** - *everywhere*
Überall sind Blumen.
There are flowers everywhere.
- **nirgendwo/nirgends** - *nowhere*
Ich kann es nirgendwo finden.
I can't find it anywhere.
- **irgendwo** - *somewhere*
Er ist irgendwo im Haus.
He's somewhere in the house.
- **draußen** - *outside*
Die Kinder spielen draußen.
The children are playing outside.
- **drinnen** - *inside*
Es ist warm drinnen.
It's warm inside.
- **oben** - *upstairs/above*
Das Buch liegt oben.
The book is upstairs.
- **unten** - *downstairs/below*
Schau unten nach.
Look downstairs.

- **vorn/vorne** - *in front*
Er sitzt vorn im Auto.
He's sitting in front in the car.
- **hinten** - *behind/in back*
Das Auto steht hinten.
The car is in back.
- **weit** - *far*
Das ist zu weit.
That's too far.
- **nah/nahe** - *near/close*
Wohnst du nah hier?
Do you live near here?

5 Adverbs of Quantity and Intensity

Mengen- und Gradadverbien - How much or to what degree

5.1 Basic Quantity Adverbs

- **sehr** - *very*
Er ist sehr intelligent.
He's very intelligent.
- **viel** - *a lot/much*
Sie arbeitet viel.
She works a lot.
- **wenig** - *little/not much*
Er isst wenig.
He doesn't eat much.
- **genug** - *enough*
Das ist genug.
That's enough.
- **zu** - *too*
Er spricht zu schnell.
He speaks too fast.
- **mehr** - *more*
Ich brauche mehr Zeit.
I need more time.
- **weniger** - *less*
Wir sollten weniger essen.
We should eat less.

- **genauso** - *just as*
Er arbeitet genauso viel wie ich.
He works just as much as I do.

5.2 Intensity Adverbs

- **völlig** - *completely*
Du hast völlig recht.
You're completely right.
- **ganz** - *completely/quite*
Das ist ganz richtig.
That's completely correct.
- **ziemlich** - *quite/rather*
Es ist ziemlich kalt heute.
It's quite cold today.
- **äußerst** - *extremely*
Das ist äußerst wichtig.
That's extremely important.
- **besonders** - *especially/particularly*
Das gefällt mir besonders gut.
I particularly like that.
- **relativ** - *relatively*
Das ist relativ einfach.
That's relatively easy.
- **absolut** - *absolutely*
Das ist absolut notwendig.
That's absolutely necessary.
- **höchst** - *highly/extremely*
Das ist höchst interessant.
That's highly interesting.

5.3 Comparative Adverbs

- **ebenso** - *equally/likewise*
Er ist ebenso intelligent.
He's equally intelligent.
- **immer mehr** - *more and more*
Es wird immer mehr.
It's becoming more and more.
- **immer weniger** - *less and less*
Ich gehe immer weniger aus.
I go out less and less.

6 Interrogative Adverbs

Frageadverbien - For questions

6.1 Basic Question Adverbs

- **wie** - *how*
Wie geht es dir?
How are you?
- **wann** - *when*
Wann kommst du?
When are you coming?
- **wo** - *where*
Wo wohnst du?
Where do you live?
- **wohin** - *where to*
Wohin gehst du?
Where are you going?
- **woher** - *where from*
Woher kommst du?
Where are you from?
- **warum/weshalb/wieso** - *why*
Warum bist du zu spät?
Why are you late?
- **wieviel** - *how much/how many*
Wieviel kostet das?
How much does that cost?

7 Modal Adverbs

Modaladverbien - Expressing attitude or certainty

- **sicher** - *certainly*
Er kommt sicher heute.
He'll certainly come today.
- **bestimmt** - *definitely*
Das ist bestimmt richtig.
That's definitely correct.
- **wahrscheinlich** - *probably*
Es regnet wahrscheinlich.
It'll probably rain.

- **vielleicht** - *maybe/perhaps*
Vielleicht komme ich später.
Maybe I'll come later.
- **hoffentlich** - *hopefully*
Hoffentlich wird das Wetter besser.
Hopefully the weather will get better.
- **leider** - *unfortunately*
Leider kann ich nicht kommen.
Unfortunately I can't come.
- **zum Glück** - *fortunately*
Zum Glück ist nichts passiert.
Fortunately nothing happened.
- **natürlich** - *naturally/of course*
Natürlich helfe ich dir.
Of course I'll help you.

8 Adverb Placement Rules

Stellungsregeln - Where to put adverbs in sentences

German Word Order with Adverbs (TeKaMoLo):

1. **T**emporal (Time) - wann?
2. **K**ausal (Reason) - warum?
3. **M**odal (Manner) - wie?
4. **L**okal (Place) - wo?

Example: Ich fahre **morgen** (Te) **wegen des Wetters** (Ka) **vorsichtig** (Mo) **nach Berlin** (Lo).

8.1 Main Clauses

In German main clauses, the conjugated verb is in second position:

- Er spricht **gut** Deutsch. (He speaks German well)
- **Heute** gehe ich ins Kino. (Today I'm going to the movies)
- Wir fahren **morgen schnell nach München**. (We're driving fast to Munich tomorrow)

8.2 Subordinate Clauses

In subordinate clauses, adverbs typically come before the verb:

- Ich weiß, dass er **gut** Deutsch **spricht**. (I know that he speaks German well)
- Er sagt, dass er **morgen kommt**. (He says that he's coming tomorrow)

9 Comparison of Adverbs

Steigerung der Adverbien - Comparing actions

9.1 Comparative Forms

- **schnell** → **schneller** - *fast* → *faster*
Er läuft schneller als ich.
He runs faster than I do.
- **gut** → **besser** - *well* → *better*
Sie singt besser als ihre Schwester.
She sings better than her sister.

- **gern** → **lieber** - *gladly* → *preferably*
Ich trinke lieber Tee als Kaffee.
I prefer drinking tea to coffee.
- **viel** → **mehr** - *much* → *more*
Er arbeitet mehr als früher.
He works more than before.

9.2 Superlative Forms

- **am schnellsten** - *fastest*
Er läuft am schnellsten.
He runs the fastest.
- **am besten** - *best*
Sie singt am besten.
She sings the best.
- **am liebsten** - *most preferably*
Ich trinke am liebsten Tee.
I like drinking tea the most.
- **am meisten** - *most*
Er arbeitet am meisten.
He works the most.

10 Common Adverbial Phrases

Adverbiale Wendungen - Multi-word adverbs

10.1 Manner Phrases

- **mit lauter Stimme** - *in a loud voice*
Er spricht mit lauter Stimme.
He speaks in a loud voice.
- **von ganzem Herzen** - *wholeheartedly*
Sie hilft von ganzem Herzen.
She helps wholeheartedly.
- **mit Absicht** - *on purpose*
Er hat das mit Absicht gemacht.
He did that on purpose.
- **aus Versehen** - *by accident*
Ich habe das aus Versehen getan.
I did that by accident.

- **auf einmal** - *suddenly/all at once*
Auf einmal begann es zu regnen.
Suddenly it started to rain.

10.2 Time Phrases

- **sofort** - *immediately*
Ich komme sofort.
I'm coming immediately.
- **ab und zu** - *from time to time*
Ab und zu lese ich ein Buch.
From time to time I read a book.
- **für immer** - *forever*
Wir werden das für immer behalten.
We'll keep that forever.
- **zur gleichen Zeit** - *at the same time*
Sie kamen zur gleichen Zeit an.
They arrived at the same time.
- **von Zeit zu Zeit** - *from time to time*
Von Zeit zu Zeit besuche ich meine Eltern.
From time to time I visit my parents.

11 Separable Prefix Adverbs

Trennbare Präfix-Adverbien - Adverbs with separable prefixes

Many German adverbs can function as separable prefixes:

- **zurück** → **zurückkommen** - *back* → *to come back*
Er kommt morgen zurück.
He's coming back tomorrow.
- **weg** → **weggehen** - *away* → *to go away*
Geh weg!
Go away!
- **rein** → **reingehen** - *in* → *to go in*
Wir gehen rein.
We're going in.
- **raus** → **rausgehen** - *out* → *to go out*
Lass uns rausgehen.
Let's go out.
- **mit** → **mitkommen** - *with* → *to come along*
Kommst du mit?
Are you coming along?

12 Regional Variations

Regionale Unterschiede - How adverbs vary across German-speaking regions

Regional Usage Notes:

- **Northern Germany:** "mal" as softening particle: "Komm mal her"
- **Southern Germany/Austria:** "halt" instead of "eben": "Das ist halt so"
- **Swiss German:** "scho" for "schon": "Er isch scho da"
- **Austrian German:** "eh" for "sowieso": "Das weiß ich eh"
- **Bavarian:** "fei" as emphasis: "Das ist fei schwer"

13 Common Mistakes and Tips

Common Mistakes to Avoid:

1. **Word order errors:** Not following TeKaMoLo rule
2. **Adjective confusion:** Using declined adjectives instead of adverbs
3. **False friends:** "actual" "aktuell" (current, not actual)
4. **Position in questions:** Wrong placement of interrogative adverbs

14 Modal Particles

Modalpartikeln - Expressing attitude and emotion

Modal particles are a special type of German adverb that express the speaker's attitude:

14.1 Common Modal Particles

- **doch** - *but/after all*
Das weißt du doch!
You know that after all!
- **mal** - *just (softening)*
Komm mal her!
Just come here!
- **ja** - *you know/indeed*
Das ist ja interessant!
That's indeed interesting!
- **denn** - *then (in questions)*
Was machst du denn?
What are you doing then?
- **wohl** - *probably/I suppose*
Er ist wohl krank.
He's probably sick.
- **etwa** - *perhaps/by any chance*
Bist du etwa müde?
Are you tired by any chance?
- **bloß/nur** - *just/only*
Was ist bloß los?
What's wrong?
- **schon** - *indeed/certainly*
Das wird schon klappen.
That will certainly work out.

15 Directional Adverbs

Richtungsadverbien - Movement and direction

15.1 The hin/her System

German distinguishes direction relative to the speaker:

- **hin** - *away from speaker*
Ich gehe hin.
I'm going there (away).
- **her** - *toward speaker*
Komm her!
Come here (toward me)!
- **hinauf** - *up (away)*
Er geht hinauf.
He's going up (away from me).
- **herunter** - *down (toward)*
Sie kommt herunter.
She's coming down (toward me).
- **hinein** - *in (away)*
Sie geht hinein.
She's going in (away from me).
- **heraus** - *out (toward)*
Er kommt heraus.
He's coming out (toward me).

18 Advanced Usage Patterns

18.1 Adverbs with Specific Verbs

Certain verbs commonly pair with specific adverbs:

- **fließend sprechen** - *to speak fluently*
Sie spricht fließend Deutsch.
She speaks German fluently.
- **tief schlafen** - *to sleep deeply*
Er schläft tief und fest.
He sleeps deeply and soundly.
- **erfolgreich arbeiten** - *to work successfully*
Wir arbeiten erfolgreich zusammen.
We work successfully together.
- **ausgezeichnet kochen** - *to cook excellently*
Sie kocht ausgezeichnet.
She cooks excellently.

18.2 Emphatic Adverb Combinations

- **wirklich sehr** - *really very*
Das ist wirklich sehr interessant.
That's really very interesting.
- **ganz besonders** - *very particularly*
Das gefällt mir ganz besonders.
I particularly like that very much.
- **viel zu** - *far too*
Das ist viel zu teuer.
That's far too expensive.
- **noch besser** - *even better*
Das ist noch besser als vorher.
That's even better than before.

19 Stylistic Considerations

19.1 Avoiding Adverb Overuse

Style Tips:

- Don't use multiple intensity adverbs together
- Vary your adverb choices - expand your vocabulary
- In formal writing, prefer precise verbs over verb + adverb
- Be careful with modal particles in formal texts
- Consider rhythm and clarity when placing adverbs

19.2 Register Awareness

- **Academic/Formal:** insbesondere, dementsprechend, folglich
- **Literary:** alsbald, keineswegs, überaus
- **Conversational:** echt, total, mega (informal intensifiers)
- **Professional:** entsprechend, demnach, infolgedessen
- **Modal particles:** More common in spoken German

20 Pronunciation Notes

Pronunciation Tips:

- **-weise endings:** Stress on first syllable: NORmalerweise
- **-lich endings:** Stress varies: WIRKlich vs. eigentLICH
- **Vowel length:** "früh" [fy:] vs. "für" [fy:]
- **Final devoicing:** "weg" pronounced [ve:k]
- **Modal particles:** Often unstressed and reduced

Remember: German adverbs follow specific placement rules that are crucial for natural-sounding German. The TeKaMoLo rule is your best friend! Modal particles add authenticity to your German but should be used carefully in formal contexts. Pay special attention to the hin/her directional system - it's a unique feature of German that adds precision to your communication!

23 Etymology and Word Formation

23.1 Historical Development

German adverbs have various origins:

- **-weise** suffix from Middle High German "wîse" (manner)
- **-lich** from Old High German "-lîh" (like/similar)
- **Modal particles** developed from full words losing meaning

- **Directional system** evolved from Old Germanic concepts

23.2 Modern Formation Patterns

- **Compound adverbs:** trotzdem, außerdem, deswegen
- **Prefix formations:** überall, nirgendwo, irgendwie
- **Borrowed forms:** super, mega, ultra (informal)
- **Shortened forms:** sowieso → eh (Austrian)

24 Special German Adverb Features

24.1 Sentence Adverbs

Some adverbs modify entire sentences:

- **leider** - *unfortunately*
Leider kann ich nicht kommen.
Unfortunately, I can't come.
- **glücklicherweise** - *fortunately*
Glücklicherweise ist alles gut gegangen.
Fortunately, everything went well.
- **offensichtlich** - *obviously*
Offensichtlich hat er sich geirrt.
Obviously, he was mistaken.

24.2 Conjunctive Adverbs

These connect ideas between sentences:

- **außerdem** - *furthermore/besides*
Er ist müde. Außerdem ist er krank.
He's tired. Furthermore, he's sick.
- **trotzdem** - *nevertheless*
Es regnet. Trotzdem gehen wir spazieren.
It's raining. Nevertheless, we're going for a walk.
- **deshalb/deswegen** - *therefore*
Ich bin müde. Deshalb gehe ich früh ins Bett.
I'm tired. Therefore I'm going to bed early.
